10) Finale Song: The Leeds Liverpool Canal By Jan Holdstock: This song tells the story of a journey along the canal 200 years ago (Tracks 15,16 and 17)

Multisensory Aims

- 1. To listen to the song
- To revise and developing actions used earlier in the book

Props

Lycra rope

Multisensory activities

- Sitting in a circle all hold on to the lycra rope and move it up and down with the pulse of the song.
- Verse 1 At the words Haul, Haul it: all group hold on to the elastic rope and act out hauling the barge pulling the rope backwards and forwards to the end of the song.
- Verse 2 At the words Fill it, Fill it: act out filling the lock by raising the lycra rope up high and swooping it down together.
- 4. Verse 3 At the words Leg it leg it: show you are pushing the barge along with your feet by pulling the lycra rope from side to side.

Musical Aims and objectives

- 1. To recognise differences of pitch
- 2. To learn to play rhythmic patterns (Ostianatos)
- 3. To become familiar with the concept of question and answer
- 4. To learn how to combine their own musical ideas and create their own compositions

Musical Instruments

- Boom whackers or chimes bars in pairs of notes, D G and C F
- 2. Wood blocks with beaters

Musical activities

- 1. Learn to sing the song from learning track 15.
- Create ostinatos to go with each verse.Here are some ideas to start with:
- a. In verse 1 create short rhythm patterns based on "Harness up your horse". Keep repeating this pattern to create an ostinato using wood blocks.
- In verse 2 use maracas to play the pattern
 "let the water in" giving the ostinato a watery
 sounding timbre.
- In verse 3 use body percussion for the words "feet are on the roof". Create patterns to go with the words.
- Divide into 2 groups: one using the notes D
 and G and the other using the notes C and F
 Have musical conversations between these
 2 groups e.g. group one play and sing: haul
 it, haul it on D and G group 2 answer, playing:
 haul it haul it on C and F. Play this between
 the verses.
- 4. Add the rhythm patterns to the tuned percussion. Create your own piece and find a way to write it down on a grid. See if you can play this back. You could add in other sections of the song or make up your own.
